
We hope you all had a lovely Summer!

We always focus on everyone in school being the best version of ourselves that they can possibly be.

Behaviour

Our behaviour policy is based on positive praise and rewards.

In Key Stage 2 we aim for a green card in the front of the class wallet all day. Green is keeping all of the Trent-Rylands rules. If these rules are broken, children will move to amber and then red.

Each half term, we host a 'Let's get...' session, where children can choose a fun activity to participate in. Being on amber or red result in minutes lost from this session. Some children with Special Educational Needs may need a bespoke behavior plan in place.

Mrs Turner hosts a weekly afternoon tea for children who have stayed on green.

We also continue to issue our star certificates every Friday to celebrate the pupil's successes.



POINTS – based on staying on green all day and extra points can be given throughout the day

Free School Meal and Pupil Premium Funding

PUPIL PREMIUM FUNDING

It is vital you apply for free school meals if you are eligible so your child receives this extra funding in school. You are eligible for free school meals if you receive any of the following benefits:-

- Universal Credit with an annual net earned income of no more than £7,400
- Income Support
- Income-based Jobseeker's Allowance (JSA)
- Income-related Employment and Support Allowance (ESA)
- Support under Part 6 of the Immigration and Asylum Act 1999
- The Guarantee element of State Pension Credit
- Working Tax Credit run-on (paid for the four weeks after the person stops qualifying for Working Tax Credit)
- **Child Tax Credit (with no Working Tax Credit) with an annual income of no more than £16,190**

It is very easy to apply. You can register for Pupil Premium Funding by following the instructions below:-


- Log onto the Nottinghamshire County Council website.
- In the search box type 'Free School Meals'.
- Click on 'Free School Meals and Milk'.
- Scroll down the page and click on 'register and apply online'. This will take you to the citizens portal.
- Register and follow the instructions to apply for free school meals and milk.

Please remember...

BRJS Year 5/6 Autumn 1 Overview



This term's topic is...

Disasters

<u>Maths</u>

The Autumn term for both Year 5 and 6 focuses on place value and calculation.



Yr 6 will be looking at place value up to 10 million; properties of number- including prime, factors and multiples and the formal calculation methods of long multiplication and division.

Yr 5 will be looking at place value up to 1 million; Roman Numerals to 1,000; rounding and formal addition and subtraction calculation strategies.

Guided Reading: 'Letters from the Lighthouse' by Emma Carroll



Visiting his dad's hometown in Japan four months after his father's death would be hard enough for Ben. But one morning the pain turns to fear: first, a massive earthquake rocks the quiet coastal village, nearly toppling his uncle's house. Then the ocean waters rise and Ben and his family are swept away-and pulled apart-by a terrible tsunami. Now Ben is alone, stranded in a strange country a million miles from home. Can be fight hard enough to survive one of the most epic disasters of all time?





BRJS Year 5/6

Autumn 1 Overview

History/ Geography

Our Geography work will focus on the locations of China and Japan. We will compare locations, learning about the human and physical features as well as looing at time zones. As part of our theme, we will research a natural disaster and present what we have learned.

In history, we'll be looking at one of the earliest civilisations: the Shang Dynasty, We'll learn who the Ancient Shang people were, where and when they lived. We will also learn about the role of the

king, the religious beliefs and rituals of the Shang people and how oracle bones were used in divination coromonies. The children will also examine a range of Shana artefacts and draw conclusions about what they can teach us.



Science

Our terms topic is the properties and changes to materials where we will:

- compare and group together everyday materials on the basis of their properties, including their hardness, solubility, transparency, conductivity (electrical and thermal), and response to magnets
- know that some materials will dissolve in liquid to form a solution, and describe how to recover a substance from a solution •
- use knowledge of solids, liquids and gases to decide how mixtures might be separated, including through filtering, sieving and evapo-rating
- give reasons, based on evidence from comparative and fair tests, for the particular uses of everyday materials, including metals, wood and plastic
- demonstrate that dissolving, mixing and changes of state are reversible changes

PE

This half term we will develop our tag rugby skills using a range of ball handling skills and techniques to improve our spatial awareness along with footwork and dodging skills . We will aim to gain possession by working as a team and use defending and attacking tactics.

The children will also participate in fitness and multi-skill techniques involving a range of activities to demonstrate stamina and increase strength.

RE/PSHE

In RE we will be thinking about how we live together as a society and the rights, roles and responsibilities of this. We will look at what different faiths believe and practice and how this links to charity work.

Our PSHE work will be about 'Being me in my world' - thinking about the year ahead and our responsibilities as part of that. We will think about our role as part of our school community and how we can all work together to make this a success.

Computing



This term's computing topic is Online Safety. We will be learning about how to use computers and the internet responsibly and how to be safe online.

Art

We will be taking inspiration from Japan with the artist Hokusai and the Great Wave of Kanagawa.

Music.

This term we will be listening to and appraising music. We will

also be learning about the building blocks of music and composing our own music based on what we have learnt and what we have listened to.

Reading and Homework

Please continue to listen to your child read regularly and sign their diaries each week. Children can bring home banded books from school and have the opportunity to change these books at least once a week. Teachers will print off the targets that go with your child's current book band and stick these in their diaries for you to see. These will be updated as your child moves up through the bands.

Each week, children will also be given a spelling list to learn based on the National Curriculum word lists.

Maths HW will be set weekly via Mathletics or Times Tables Rockstars, linked to the topic covered in Maths that week. Each child's LOGIN details will be stuck inside their diaries.

Handwriting: As a school, we now use Letter-Join to teach our handwriting. Joined up handwriting is part of the requirements for the end of KS2. We will send home information on how to access this programme at home for children to practice further.
